## Federal Inspection Scheduled April 9

The date for the annual formal and general inspection of the St. John's Military program under the National Defense Cadet Corps program has been set for April 9.

The inspection is held annually to judge the quality of the military program at ROTC and NDCC schools.

St. John's has earned the top rating, honor school, each year it has been in the program.

Classes are dismissed for the day and inspectors view parades, check records and inspect barracks and military knowledge.

# Want A Promotion?

## Here's How!

Requirements for promotions were recently re-emphasized in a special order by Capt. Jack P. McCandless, Commandant.

To be considered for promotion a Cadet must be passing in all academic and military subjects, have a character rating of 4.9 or better, a deportment rating of 5.0, and must have passed the Old Boy examination.

Also considered will be qualities of leadership.

A Cadet with rank who fails to maintain the requirements will be placed on probation for a grading period. If the requirements are not met, the Cadet will be reduced one step in rank.

Capt. McCandless said semester grades will be of greater importance than monthly grades. Final approval for promotions rests with the commandant's office and the faculty.
