## Furlough Nears!

### Cadets To Homes For Christmas Season

Rest and relaxation will occupy most Cadets during the two-week Christmas furlough. Furlough begins at 10:30 a.m., Friday, Dec. 18 in order for west-bound Cadets to board the Portland Rose train at 11:11 a.m.

Furlough ends at 7 p.m., Sunday, Jan. 3.

A modified class schedule will be in effect on Friday, Dec. 18 with each class lasting about 25 minutes. Col. R. L. Clem, Superintendent and Rector, reminds Cadets and parents that early dismissals are not approved. Zeros are given for class work missed on the day furlough begins.

Library books are to be turned into the library following classes on Dec. 16, according to Mrs. H. E. Nuss, School Librarian.

The following is a saying written over the doorsteps of an old school in Germany:

"If you have lost wealth, you have lost nothing,  
If you have lost health, you have lost something,  
If you have lost character, you have lost all."

Our character, our honor, our code are reflected in what we do and show ourselves to be! In your pass for Christmas fur-  
lough, you have signed a pledge to be honorable gentlemen and to uphold the rules and regulations of the Corps and the school. Yet I have heard some men infer that they not only will back-  
slide but intend to violate the pledge without regard to their signature - - a sign of their honor and integrity.

To even jokingly suggest that such conduct would be think-  
able is to lower one's self to dirt and to the lowest form of dis-  
loyalty. If you cannot be trusted in this matter of obedience, in  
what area of life should you be trusted?

If you can lie to yourself and to others and secretly cross  
your fingers and promise anything to gain privilege when you in-  
tend to do anything other than to live by what you have said,  
then you have become the kind of person who will be the next  
Lee Harvey Oswald.

This is a stern message, but honor is a sacred trust upon  
which personal integrity is built between men. Without it, no  
home is safe, no values would exist and no man could walk in  
the street unarmed. Any slight crack or tarnish of honor, lowers  
the status of every young man, brings disrespect upon the family  
and friends of those who hold you to be worth knowing.

You might be asking, Do you really mean that someone might  
look down on me as scum?" The answer is yes!

What makes me so proud is that so many have ask for a  
new and higher code of honor to be developed at St. John's. So  
I know that you are concerned about the apparent lack of this  
quality in some.

Do you want that new Honor Code and system for St. John's?  
Let's start now to form a Cadet Committee for the development  
of an Honor Code. Who will serve? It will take true men. Ones  
unafraid to grow and be bold as the knights of old. Valor is not  
cheap. Honor comes high because it is noble and glorious in the

Five St. John's Cadets attend-  
ed the first Governor's Teenage  
Leadership Seminar in To-  
peka's Municipal auditorium  
Nov. 29.

Nearly 800 students from pub-  
lic, private and parochial  
schools throughout Kansas at-  
tended the day-long meeting.  
The students concentrated on  
questions of moral and spiritual  
values in the home, athletics  
and social life during three af-  
ternoon seminars.

## "Old Boy" Writes Of Cadet Days

Additional highlights to the history of St. John's School have been brought to light by E. B. Putnam, Class of 1922, Fresno, Calif.

Mr. Putnam had received a copy of the School History written by Capt. V. B. Loy and wrote the school a five-page letter with remembered incidents of his school career.

He wrote: "St. John's in the 19th centry was such a small school and so dependent on the citizenry of Salina for support that they included all the prominent people of the area as well as current swains in order to get an attendance to their social functions, dances, commencements, etc. Later a rivalry developed among the town boys and the cadets as they clashed sometimes over the favors of the town girls."

He continued: "I entered St. John's about 1920. I was an obnoxious brat, having had too much of everything too soon, and thought that I was something rather special. It did not take long at St. John's to prove that I was laboring under a misapprehension. After about a week of sessions behind the old gym with various and sundry old boys of pretty fair talents, it became apparent that perhaps I was not one of the anointed, and as I could not whip all of them, maybe it would be wise to join them. I got smart, academically no, but in other ways, yes. Suffice it to say that my various endeavors earned me the dubious distinction of serving more extra duty than anyone in the Cadet Corps (267 hours in on semester). I had to unload two carloads (80 tons) of coal before we could leave school the Christmas of 1921. I had callouses for years on my shoulder from carrying the old 11-pound Beaumont rifle around the bullring."

"One very interesting episode in St. John's history occurred in 1920. The Shriners made a trip to Portland and Seattle on a special train. While out there they were presented with a cub bear which was named ISIS the name of Salina's Shrine Temple. After much trouble with Isis getting away, being a nuisance to care for, etc., Colonel Ganssle was prevailed upon to accept the cub as a mascot to the school. There were several old chicken houses and old cottonwood trees back of Vail Hall and Isis was quartered in one and chained to a tree. We all used to play with him and wrestled and tumbled with him continually. However along about 1921, Isis was two
