For Former Bishop . . .

## New Dorm to be Named MIZE HALL

The new Lower School barracks, now under construction, will be named Mize Hall. The name was selected recently by a committee of the school's Trustees.

The hall will be named in memory of the Rt. Rev. Robert Herbert Mize during Commencement activities at the school, May 21-23.

Bishop Mize was Bishop of the Episcopal Missionary District of Salina and during his lifetime also served St. John's as a teacher, chaplain, superintendent, rector and as president of the Board of Trustees.

The new barracks, costing \$250,000, will house 88 Cadets and four faculty families. Construction was started in November of 1964 and it is hoped the structure will be ready for use during the 1965-66 school year. It is the largest building project ever undertaken at St. John's.

Bishop Mize came to St. John's School in 1898 as a young minister to serve as chaplain and teacher. He then served as the rector of the school from 1899 to 1906.

In 1921 Bishop Mize returned to St. John's School as the Bishop of Salina and also became president ex-officio of the St. John's Board. Col. W. L. Ganssle was the superintendent of the school at that time.

With the termination of Col.

Ganssle's association with St. John's, Bishop Mize once again came to the helm of the school. He closed his home in Salina, moved his family to St. John's and assumed the responsibilities of superintendent.

For the next three years, 1929-31 Bishop Mize continued to head the school. During this period he started a crusade to upgrade academic standards and to renovate and improve the physical plant.

The Rev. Jerome Fritsche served as superintendent from 1931 to 1934 when once again Bishop Mize assumed the responsibilities as head of the school from 1934 to 1936.

Col. R. L. Clem, present rector and superintendent, came to St. John's in July of 1936 and began the longest continuous service by one person as head of the school.

The long association between Bishop Mize and St. John's ended in 1938 during his closing year of his long episcopate. Because of his many years of service, Bishop Mize was elected president emeritus of the Board of Trustees. In his capacity as Bishop of Salina, Bishop Mize served as the president ex-officio from 1921 to 1938 when he retired.

Bishop Mize's three children were also active in life at St. John's. The Rt. Rev. Robert H. Mize jr., now Bishop of Damaraland in Africa, was a former student, member of the faculty, and a past trustee of the school. The Rev. Edward Mize was a former student, served as school chaplain and was a teacher. Mrs. Forrest C. (Margaret) Braden, Yuma, Ariz. was a teacher. A grandson of Bishop Mize, Forrest C. Braden jr., is an "old boy" of the school.

## Other Buildings Named

. . . Also For Bishops

Three other buildings at St. John's Military School have received names. When the Board of Trustees met to select a name for the new Lower School barracks, names were also given to other structures on campus.

The committee to select the names was headed by Kenneth Wright.

The school dining hall will be formally named Nichols Hall in memory of the Rt. Rev. Shirley H. Nichols, Bishop of Salina and president of the Board of Trustees of St. John's School from 1941 to 1955. Bishop Nichols was active in affairs of the school at the time the dining hall was constructed.

The building referred to as the "old barracks" will be named in memory of the Rt. Rev. Sheldon Griswold, Bishop of the Episcopal district of Salina from 1903 to 1917. The barracks finished in 1952 will be named in memory of the Rt. Rev. John C. Sage, Bishop of Salina and president of the board from 1917 to 1919.

The formal ceremony of naming the structures and the new Low School barracks will be held during Commencement weekend, May 21-23.

## Cornerstone Ceremony Planned

The cornerstone for the new Lower School barracks will be put in place at a special ceremony at 2 p.m., Saturday, May 22. The building will also be formally named Mize Hall at that time.

Invited to attend the ceremony are the late Rt. Rev. Robert H. Mize's three children. Other members of the Mize family have also been invited to represent the family on this occasion.

The building, costing \$250,000, is the largest project ever undertaken by the school. About \$150,000 of the cost was raised in a capital fund drive last year. Funds to pay the balance of the cost are still being sought.

Ground for the building was broken during Thanksgiving activities. It is expected that the building, housing 88 boys, will be ready for use by late fall.

Various mementos of the school will be placed in a sealed lead box within the cornerstone. This issue of The Skirmisher will be included.
