## Fire M-14 Course At Fort Riley

The Cadet Corps of St. John's Military School recently paid its annual visit to Ft. Riley, Kans., under the auspices of the National Defense Cadet Corps Program. Maj. Arthur W. Long and Maj. William V. Webb accompanied the Cadets to the Fort near Junction City.

The First Battalion of the 26th Infantry acted as host to the Cadets. After establishing billets in the Camp Funston area, the Cadets moved to a demonstration of bayonet fighting and close combat.

Following evening mess, a talk on the history of the 26th Infantry was given by Battalion Sergeant Major Dobol who has been a member of the 26th for 25 years of duty.

The Cadets had planned to fire the M-14 qualification course in sunny weather but the day began with mist accompanied by a cold blowing wind. After marching to the area of the qualifying range, the Cadets sampled the Army's newest C-rations.

During the day, 102 of the 170 Cadets fired qualifying scores—6 experts, 34 sharpshooters and 62 marksmen. Cadet Tim Olsen fired the highest score with 43 of a possible 54 points.

After evening mess, the Cadets cleaned their weapons and returned them to the armory.

A day of demonstrations was held on Saturday. An artillery unit demonstrated meteorological checking systems, radar and the Honest John rocket system. An aviation display included the operation and mission of the Pathfinder unit. This unit is designed to move into small area and set up

troop deployment areas under any conditions.

Cadets rode in the new M-113 APC as a part of the armored personnel carrier demonstration.

Lt. Col. Jack S. French commended the Cadets on their willingness to learn and made them honorary members of the 26th Infantry.

Events on the final day included a late sleep, morning mess, social hour and an interesting sermon given by an Army chaplain.

The Cadets returned to the school in the late afternoon of April 4.

### Maintenance Shop, Warehouse Building Being Erected

A new maintenance and storage building is being constructed in back of Vail Hall on College Court.

The old sheds and garage back of the building are now being torn down. The work of razing is 70 percent completed.

The new building will not exceed an estimated cost figure of \$12,000. This will be a 120 by 30 foot Armco building. School maintenance personnel will erect the building.

A shop and equipment repair station will be built in one end of the building. The shop has been located in Vail Hall under the office area.

Coach Shublom was born and raised in Salina. He is a personal friend of Cadet Coach Dean Kindlesparger.

Following graduation from Salina high school, he played professional baseball with a Pittsburg Pirate farm club. He was graduated from Southeast Missouri State College with a B. S. degree following 38 months of duty with the U.S. Navy.

Shublom came to Wyandotte High in Kansas City as assistant basketball coach in 1952. In the fall of 1955 he was named to head the Bulldog basketball program. He also received his Masters Degree from the University of Kansas during the summer of 1955.

Since that time, he has led the Bulldogs to seven state championships — five consecutive — and three runner-up teams to the champion. In his ten years his record stands 217 wins, 15 defeats.
