He also gave the assembly a brief description of his new position as bishop for the U.S. Armed Forces in Europe. He also thanked the trustees and school for their support during his time in Salina.

Col. R. L. Clem, Rector and Superintendent, presented Bishop Lewis with a gift on behalf of the Military school's students and personnel.

Mrs. Clem presented Mrs. Lewis with a gift in remembrance of the school and its staff.

## Basement Walls Poured

### . . . On New Barracks

Construction on the new 88-man Junior School barracks is progressing nicely according to Lt. Col. Keith G. Duckers, Assistant Superintendent.

The footings for the basement and part of the basement walls have been poured. The construction is beginning to rise out of the excavation.

Colonel Duckers said, "We have been fortunate to have had so much nice weather which has permitted construction to proceed as scheduled. With lots of good weather there is a chance the building could be ready by next September."

Busboom and Rauh Construction has the general contract on the \$250,000 building.

It is hoped the building will be ready for use for the 1965-66 school year.

A fund drive was conducted last year to finance the building. About \$150,000 was given and pledged. Contributions will still be accepted.

C. N. Hoffman Jr., chairman of the executive committee of the trustees, gave Bishop Lewis a plaque in appreciation for his service as ex-officio president.

The buffet dinner was prepared and served by Chef Frank Moomau and Mrs. Moomau.

The Bishop and Mrs. Lewis left Salina Friday, Jan. 15, on their way to New York and their new home and headquarters.

## Cadets Routed By Small Fire

The sleep of nearly 170 Cadets and faculty members was interrupted for two hours by a fire early Sunday morning, Jan. 17.

Col. R. L. Clem, Rector and Superintendent, said no one was injured and less than \$1000 damage was done to the Old Barracks building.

Colonel Clem particularly commended the leadership of the Cadet Officers who routed the Corps out of bed and vacated the building in a matter of minutes.

Also receiving commendations from Colonel Clem were members of the staff living in quarters in Vail Hall. Taking over and giving guidance and direction were staff members Lt. David Kuchera, Lt. George Walker and Maj. William Webb.

Lt. Walker called the fire department and helped move personnel belongings of Cadets living in rooms entered in fighting the blaze.

Major Webb went through each room of the darkened barracks checking that every Cadet had been awakened.

Lt. Kuchera directed Cadets to the chapel and then wakened other staff members.

Colonel Clem said, "We have an automatic electronic fire detection system and there are units in all parts of both old barracks and the older junior school barracks. This system alerted us about 3:30 a.m. and the boys were out of the building and into the chapel, which is warm in three minutes. Even though it was the middle of the

night, this fire detection system blared out and saved not only the building, but possibly some lives."

Colonel Clem added that an added precautionary measure the automatic system is being connected directly with the Salina Fire department via a telephone company connection.

Colonel Clem said the fire apparently began in a wall under the first floor near the bathroom area. It spread to the other walls in the south end of the building before it was contained by firemen. There was smoke damage and some water damage because a water pipe melted.

"The cause has not yet been determined officially," he said, "and the fire inspectors are still investigating."

"We had the power re-established to the building and the boys back in by 5:30 a.m., with heat, water, lights and other utilities all in operation."

The colonel said he believes the automatic fire detection system and a full-time night watchman give Cadets as much protection as is possible.

Old Boy tests were conducted by the Cadet Court Sunday afternoon, Jan. 17. The tests will be continued this week until all new boys have had an opportunity to take the test.

The new "old boys" will be announced by special order after all tests have been given.



## Military Schools Offer Advantages

Certain advantages are available to Cadets enrolled at St. John's Military School that are not usually available in other types of schools.

Maj. Gen. Delmar Spivey, Superintendent of Culver Military Academy, summed up the advantages of a military school education in an article in the Armed Forces Times Family Magazine this summer.

He wrote: "Here are the major advantages of the military boarding school as I see them:

The military system instills the self-discipline every persons needs to acquire. Each student is responsible for his own actions in every phase of life at a military school.

Leadership training opportunities are excellent. Every boy has the opportunity to follow and then to lead in any activities. He learns respect for constituted authority and the responsibilities of leadership as well as its privileges.

The philosophy and methodology of the military system promotes a sense of national interest and a firm understanding of responsible citizens.

Teenage boys value the tangible rewards which result from successful, cooperative competition. The military system admirably provides such a means and such rewards.

The military system eliminates the outward trappings of affluence. A boy is judged solely on his accomplishments, not what his parents have accomplished. This is not conformity but equality."

Teaching the new class is the school chaplain, the Rev. Donald Overton. The course will cover religion, philosophy and history and will be studied with the idea that all people of the past influence our daily experiences. It is a seminar discussion-type class.

Other semester courses are "World Geography" and "Economics," taught by Lt. Col. Paul Kellogg; "Sociology," taught by Lt. Dean Kindlesparger; "Music Appreciation," Capt. Jim Bell and "Speech," Chaplain Overton.

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## Deadline Nears for Senior Trip To Washington, New York

Senior Cadets at St. John's once again have the opportunity to participate in the Kansas Council on World Affairs Tour to Washington D. C., New York City and the United Nations and the World's Fair. The deadline for making reservations is Feb. 16.

Cadets will take the tour from April 25 to May 2 which includes a full day at the World's Fair.

## .22 Course Is Tough!

A change in the official Army .22 caliber target has brought frustration to Cadets firing the course at the school according to Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey, firing coach.

It is now more difficult to shoot a qualifying score and earn an Army firing medal said Colonel Guernsey.

He explained although the overall size of the bullseye remains the same, the scoring zones of the bullseye have been changed. For example, the 10-point zone has been reduced to the size of a period and what used to be a 5-point zone is now valued at one point.

All Cadets receive instruction in marksmanship and are required to shoot the Army .22 caliber course of fire. This practice prepares cadets to fire the .30 caliber course at the Ft. Riley rifle range later this year.

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## S.J.M.S. - CSU To Again Offer Summer Program

A summer school program on the campus of Colorado State University will be conducted again this year by St. John's Military School.

Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey will again be director of the session which will begin June 14 and end Aug. 6 in Ft. Collins. Other members of the staff will be announced later.

Students and faculty will live in the Sigma Nu fraternity house. A student may earn 1½ units or three credits during the session.

Courses are offered in the subject-matter fields of science, social studies, mathematics and English. Credits can be transferred.

The program is non-military with various weekend field trips planned including weekends at Pingree Park camp in the Rocky Mountains.

Cost of the session is \$650 which includes board, room, tuition and a charge for the University Student Health service. All facilities at Colorado State are available for student use.
