Two Special Trips Planned for Jan. 27

Special second semester trips have been arranged for Saturday, Jan. 27. Cadets will make trips to various points of interest within a day's driving distance of Salina according to Col. Keith G. Duckers, Acting Superintendent.

One bus-load of boys will visit Ft. Leavenworth. A chartered bus will take the Cadets on the 500-mile round trip.

The Cadets will visit the Post Museum, have a guided tour of the fire control and launching areas of a NIKE site with an explanation of the radars and how they operate, and will have a drive-through tour of the Federal Penitentiary, also at Leavenworth.

This bus will leave campus at 6:30 a. m. and will return by 8 p. m. Dinner will be eaten enroute to Salina that evening.

Two chartered buses will make the trip to Kansas City for the day. The buses will leave at 7 a. m. and will arrive in Kansas City shortly after 9 a. m. The Cadets may spend the day as they wish—sightseeing, shopping or attending movies. The buses will leave Kansas City at 5 o'clock for the return trip. Dinner will be eaten in Topeka. It is expected the boys will return to campus about 11 p. m.

A New Year Gives A New Beginning

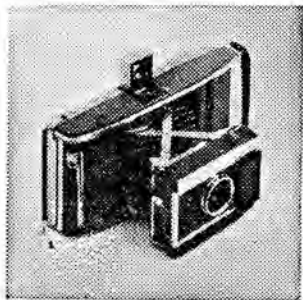
Another new year.

Senior Cadets May Make Trip To Washington D. C., New York

St. John's Senior Cadets will again have the opportunity to participate in the 12th annual Easter Vacation tour, April 10-17, to Washington D. C. and New York City. The trip, sponsored by the Kansas Student Tour Council, is a week-long trip planned especially for high school students.

Senior Cadets are eligible to go providing they are maintaining satisfactory academic work according to LCDR. H. E. Nuss, Director of Studies.

The group will leave Salina Wednesday evening, April 10. The next day will be spent visiting points of interest in Chicago before the students board a train in the late afternoon for Washington.

The group will arrive in Washington, April 12 and will visit the Capitol Building and grounds, White House, Bureau of Printing and Engraving;

visit President Kennedy's grave in Arlington National Cemetery; visit Mt. Vernon and in the evening will be taken on a lectured tour with stops at the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials and the National Archives Building.

A visit will be made to the Smithsonian Institute before the tour leaves for New York City.

Special activities planned for the New York visit are a boat trip around Manhattan Island; a comprehensive bus tour of

the City, and a visit to the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

The last day in the City will feature a complete guided tour and briefing at the United Nations before the group leaves late in the afternoon for the trip home.

Students will be assigned to groups of 24 each with chaperones in charge of each group.

Cost of the tour from Salina is \$168.50 which includes round trip fare, all meals except two, admissions, guide fees, sight-seeing fees, transfers, hotel accommodations, tips and baggage handling.
