Many Activities Planned During April

Federal Inspection Set For Wednesday April 24

Career Day To Be Wednesday April 17

.... Honor Rating Is Goal

The Federal Inspection of the junior Reserve Officer Training Corps Detachment at St. John's Military School will be made Wednesday, April 24 according to Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, Commandant.

The inspecting officer will be Maj. Joseph R. Bowman, (infantry), from the Fifth Army Headquarters in Chicago, Ill. He will be accompanied by another inspecting officer who will be named later.

Making arrangements for the day-long inspection will be Col. Kellogg, M/Sgt. Tom Watson and F/Sgt. Robert Herndon, military instructors, and Maj. C. W. Buttermore, III, Senior Army Instructor.

The inspecting officers will be greeted by an honor guard upon their arrival on campus. A personal inspection of the 80th Corps will be made.

The officers will see a review and parade; will watch performances by the Drum and Bugle Corps, Crack Platoon and Crack Squad, and visit a military class.

They will inspect military records and supplies. The inspection usually ends about 4 p.m.

St. John's won an honor school rating, the top ranking, last year in its first year under the ROTC program. Previously the school had won honor rat-

ings as a National Defense Cadet Corps School.

Tours in New York City will include a boat trip around the island, a visit to the Statue of Liberty, Chinatown, Wall Street District, Times Square, and a stop at the Cathedral of St. John The Divine. The Cadets will be able to witness the famed Easter Parade along Fifth avenue on Easter Day.

Before boarding the train for the return trip, the tour group will have a complete tour and briefing at the United Nations.

"Old Boy" Dies In Vietnam

A St. John's "old boy", Marine Capt. Frederick L. Schram of the Class of 1957, was reported killed in action while serving in Vietnam. Schram was the commander of the 1956-57 Crack Drill Squad.

Schram was the pilot of a helicopter that crashed Jan. 8 near Dong Ha in Quang Tri Province. His body hasn't been recovered, officials said.

A memorial service was held March 17 in the Aviation Memorial Chapel at Pensacola Naval Air Station in Florida. Schram was stationed at Pensacola before being sent to Vietnam and his wife, Lynn, and son, Eric, 11 months, still live there.

After leaving St. John's, Schram was graduated from Western State College, Gunnison, Colo., and joined the Marines in 1964. He was sent to Vietnam last May.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Schram, formerly of Denver, now live in Redondo Beach, Calif.

The book, "The Great Escape", headed the best seller list at the annual Book Fair sponsored by the National Honor Society, Feb. 27-29.

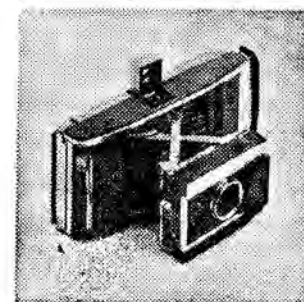
A group of 250 paperback volumes were on display in L-22 classroom from which the Cadets could place orders.
