Christmas Furlough Plans Made

Two-Week Vacation Begins

10:30 a.m., Dec. 20; Ends Jan. 3

Christmas furlough begins at 10:30 a. m., Wednesday, Dec. 20 for all St. John's Military School Cadets. The two-week furlough ends at 7 p. m., Wednesday Jan. 3.

Col. Keith G. Duckers, Acting Superintendent, said that past experiences have forced the School to take a new stand on requests for Cadets to leave early or return late. The scheduled times for furlough must be strictly adhered to in all cases and no exceptions will be made.

Once again the School has arranged for chartered buses to depart from the campus with the West-bound Cadets at 11 a. m. on Dec. 20. The bus will drive non-stop, except to discharge passengers en route, to the Continental Trailways terminal in Denver. Approximate arrival time in Denver is 5:45 p. m. (MST). The buses will leave the terminal at 10 a. m. Jan. 3 for the return trip to the School.

The Cadets will be provided with box lunches when they leave Salina and parents are being asked to provide a meal on the return trip.

Colonel Duckers said that Cadets traveling by public transportation may remain at the School up to 24 hours after furlough begins. Cadets are asked not to return before 12:01 a. m. on Jan. 3. Cadets must report to the school in person not more than one hour after they arrive in Salina.

Cadets traveling on the Santa Fe railroad will go to Newton on a bus for the trip home. For the return trip, the School will have someone in Hutchinson at 6 p. m. to meet the train and return the boys to Salina.

Parents are reminded that the furlough permit must be signed and returned to the Office of the Commandant regardless of the mode of transportation.

Cadets will wear Class Alpha uniforms to leave campus, en-route home, and upon return to the School. Civilian clothing will be confiscated if returned to the campus after furlough.

The baggage room will be open for the issuing of luggage on Dec. 17. Orders, tickets, and authorized expense money will be issued on Dec. 19 at times to be announced later.

Cadets wishing to eat noon mess at the School on Dec. 20 will sign the mess roster in the Commandant's office before 12 noon, Dec. 19. Snacks will be served at the School at the end of furlough from 5:30 to 6 p. m., Jan. 3.

Cadets to Visit Homes, Jan. 14

The Sunday of Jan. 14 has been tentatively selected as the date for the annual Cadet visitation to Salina homes.

The Cadets attend church services with a host couple from that church and are guests in the homes following the worship service.

The Rev. Richard Feallock, Chaplain, said more details will be available following furlough.

Christmas Parties Being Planned

A program of caroling and Christmas stories will follow the traditional Christmas dinner in Nichols Dining Hall, Dec. 19. Arrangements are being handled by the Rev. Richard Feallock, Chaplain.

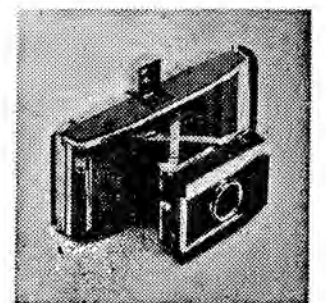
