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## Federal Inspection Day Program Is Successful

### ... All is Satisfactory

The 80th Corps of Cadets at St. John's Military School was found "satisfactory" in all of some 75 categories during the Federal Inspection of the ROTC detachment Wednesday, April 24, according to Lt. Col. Paul Kellogg, Commandant.

The final rating of the School will not be known until sometime this summer. The Army inspectors must make their reports to their commander in Fifth Army Headquarters, Chicago, Ill.

The inspecting officer was Maj. Joseph R. Bowman, infantry, from Fifth Army Headquarters in Chicago, Ill. He was accompanied by a second inspecting officer Major James Rogers.

The inspectors arrived on campus at 8:30 a.m. to be greeted by an Honer Guard of Cadets. Following inspection of the Guard, the visiting officers watched the beginning of a demonstration military class, inspected the ROTC facilities, made an inspection of personnel and barracks rooms and were guests of the 80th Corps for lunch in Nichols Dining Hall.

Things were going well and all were comfortable, or reasonably so, until a strong north wind accompanied by a shower and some hail hit the area about 2:30 a.m.

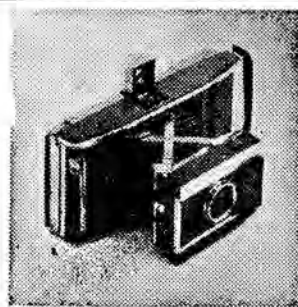
