Pastors' Day Plans Made

The schedule for Pastor's Day, March 4, has been announced by the Rev. Richard Feallock, School Chaplain.

The day will begin with a coffee, registration and a briefing at the Superintendent's home from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

A tour of the School will be made, a visit made to classes and the visitors will view the noon formation before eating lunch.

The afternoon schedule calls for individual clergy discussion with groups of five to eight Cadets from 1 to 2 p.m. to be followed by an Upper School panel to discuss questions. This panel will be at 2:15 p.m. to be followed by a similar panel discussion in the Lower School at 3:15 p.m.

The clergy will be free to visit with faculty, staff and individual Cadets from 4 to 6 p.m.

Fr. Feallock said, "This day may offer a minister his first glimpse into the away-from-home life of today's teenager, reflecting the less obvious ways of your teenagers back home."

A moderator, the Rev. William Powell, Christian Education director for the Episcopal District of Western Kansas, will assist with the discussions as well as tie together the re-

sults of both panels to be mailed to the clergy later.

Fr. Feallock said that a discussion for those involved in youth activities can be included Monday evening, but the planned activities will end with evening mess.

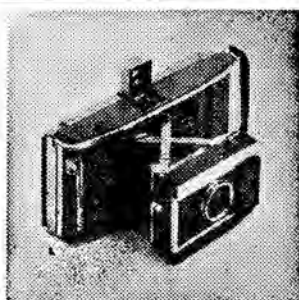
