Salina, Kansas, was on the tip of thousands of tongues this week when announcement was made of one of the richest uranium finds in the United States on the campus of St. John's Military School.

Hundreds of cars roared into this quiet central Kansas town to drive by the mine which was discovered by a brilliant young Cadet science student on his home-made Geiger counter.

While the world spoke his name, modest sophomore Cadet Paul Stappenbeck, quickly returned to his laboratory to do research on a new system of detecting gold-brickers. Stappenbeck is working on his latest project by special request of the Society for the Prevention of Gold Bricking in the Corps of S.J.M.S. Cadets.

The uranium mine is expected to go into full production sometime early next month. Meanwhile, young Stappenbeck is in daily conference with members of the Atomic Energy Commission on progress in the development of the uranium mine.

Roy Hovey, forged a special Sunday girl-friend pass and ilew to California on six different Sunday afternoons to do the bugling.



Academy awards were given to the best movie and actors, and the School movie was picked as the number one movie of the year. "This is St. John's" was awarded the Oscar.

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

as possible on location at Camp Gordon in Georgia.

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

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
